News from the AGM 2007

The AGM was held at Bedford Museum and there was a good turnout.

Malcolm Oliver gave an uplifting report about the Group and its activities. Unfortunately, due to work commitments Malcolm has stood down as Chairperson this year, so any volunteers please come forward.

On a much brighter note, Richard Cox has taken over the Treasurer's role following the excellent work of Dick Denton who stepped down this year. We wish Dick all the best and thank him for his time given to the Group. We also welcomed Jack Kirby and John Comont onto the committee. All remaining committee members continue their roles (see back page for details).

The evening was made especially good by the talk given by Dr Mark Barron of the BGS who told us more about the Jurassic of Bedfordshire than we could have known.

A huge thank you to all those who attended and we look forward to an even better turnout in 2008.

Our first talks event was held at Totternhoe on 20th September. This special event kicked off our Autumn/Winter talks programme. We had two excellent speakers, Mr Barry Horne of the Leighton Buzzard and District Archaeological and Historical Society (LBDAHS) and Dr Haydon Bailey of Network Stratigraphic Consulting.

Mr Horne started with an enthralling talk on the Totternhoe Stone and how it was discovered and quarried in mysterious underground tunnels. A wonderful talk with many interesting slides of a bygone age.

"The Forensic Use of Microfossils" was the title of Dr Bailey's talk. He gave a fascinating insight into how a geologist works at the microscopic end of the subject. It brought the whole of the Chalk alive through the minuscule fragments of rock that can only be seen through the lens of a microscope. Unfortunately, there were only a handful of members who joined us on the evening, but we did have many guests, including Joan Curran who wrote a very informative book on the subject of the Totternhoe Stone.

There was a display of Totternhoe Stone and the B&LGG poster display was put up for all to read.

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Dr Julian Murton of the University of Sussex gave the 2nd talk in the Autumn/Winter programme. His talk was "Reconstructing Ice Age environmental change along the foot of the Chilterns scarp, Marsworth, Buckinghamshire".

He described the importance of porosity in chalk and how erosion of chalk is analogous with soil permafrost, with an insight into the processes that form dry valleys and coombes, which are evident in the Chalk Downs across Bedfordshire. There were wonderful descriptions of the laboratory modelling that explained so much about the subject.

The many Ice Age fossils that have been found at Marsworth indicate the type of environment that existed during the Holocene Ice Ages.

Chris Andrew put out a small display of the Ice Age fossils available to view at Bedford Museum, including a mammoth (or elephant) tooth.

Bedfordshire's Historic Environment Information Officer, Stephen Coleman, gave us an excellent slide show on 'Archaeology with a Geological Spin'. This evening, again held at Bedford Museum, was well attended.

Stephen took us on a fascinating tour across Bedfordshire's geology, showing us how the geology affected where ancient inhabitants of Bedfordshire lived. From the river gravels of the Ouse and Ivel to the peat in the Flit Valley, human habitation has been affected by and has effected local geology.

There were great views of quarries that can only be seen from the air, along with hidden features in the landscape, such as periglacial pingos, tundra polygons and ice wedges, only visible through crop markings.

A terrific evening, despite the dreadful traffic problems causing a slight delay to the start of the evening.

Geomorphology is the understanding of the form of the Earth's land surface and the processes by which it is shaped, both at the present day as well as in the past. Research into the processes of weathering and erosion, sediment transport and deposition, the characterisation of landforms and the materials of which they are composed is the mainstay of a geomorphologist's work.

Bedfordshire's RIGS of geomorphological interest include the river valleys of the Ouzel and the Ivel. But many features can be seen in other areas of Bedfordshire.

Totternhoe Stone Pit

Following the Talks evening at Totternhoe, a group of members met on a rather wet and dreary Friday afternoon. Angus Clarke, who quarries the Stone, met us at the Pit.



He gave us a fascinating insight into how he extracts the rock without damaging it and a vivid depiction of his father shouting down to Angus from his digger!



We saw some wonderful trace fossils on the extracted blocks of Totternhoe Stone and excellent basal features that make this rock so scientifically interesting, thus the SSSI status of the Pit.

We ended the afternoon with a walk through the now disused Lime Co's quarry and saw a higher-level exposure of the Totternhoe Stone. Although the famous limekilns of the Lime Co are now all gone, as we walked back to the car park we could see some of the old working areas and the bottom of the limekiln ovens.

Through email discussion forums we will hopefully have an influence on East of England Regional Strategies and policy making.

Project News and Upcoming Events

Potton Scout Hut

Whilst researching information for the new industrial leaflet series, Bev Fowlston was searching for coprolite workings in and around Potton with the help of B&LGG member Ray Piercy. It was during these explorations that Ray showed Bev a rare exposure of Bedfordshire's Lower Greensand.

The idea for a small geoconservation project was born!

After agreement with Potton Scout Association, a proposal was put forward and accepted. The project is to clean a small area of the 150m face of what was a Victorian building stone and sand quarry. Work on the history of the quarry is being carried out on our behalf by Potton History Society. The site will be used to educate and inspire young and old alike, with easy access for groups of enthusiasts who have difficulty getting into working quarries.

To learn more about this wonderful opportunity to expose the Lower

Greensand and preserve it for future generations, then come along on Sunday 9th or Saturday 15th December.

Kensworth Quarry

Following a meeting in November between B&LGG, Beds CC, Grondworks, The Wildlife Trusts, The National Trust and, of course, CEMEX an initial short term project was agreed.

The B&LGG will be providing an interpretation board for the SSSI Nature Reserve, where a chalk face has been left exposed but with no interpretation it is of little use to geologists interested in the chalk.



There is also a need to clean the exposure of vegetation and debris. Again, this is a chance for you to get involved with a small geoconservation project where you will learn about the chalk exposures and how we can enhance these rare sites.
