Emphasis on RIGS



RIGS and other site updates

News from The Pinnacle

Following the report from the last newsletter, a site investigation was carried out by Dr Martin Whiteley, Richard Dowsett and Bev Fowlston on 17th June 2008.

The Pinnacle Recreation Ground rests on top of an outcrop of the Woburn Sands Formation in Sandy.

The exposure was thought to be Clay-with-Fossils which was recorded in the 1960's and 70's but has not been seen since. The torrential rains in May 2008 exposed a clay horizon and Richard Lawrence, who first detected this new exposure, found a fossil *Gryphaea*. The question is; was this layer the previously recorded Claywith-Fossils or just clay?

The area for investigation was approximately 2.5 metres from the top of the Pinnacle, facing south. It was in a shallow gully that runs from the top of the Pinnacle westwards down towards the railway line at the foot of the main outcrop. On first glance, the clay seen by Richard Lawrence was not visible. The outcrop had degraded and loose sands once again hid the exposure. The area was dug back and a lenticular horizon of greygreen clay was revealed. This horizon was about 40cm wide by 3cm high and 50cm beneath the present level of the grass. Small fragments of iron-rich goethite(?) and derived phosphate-rich fossil fragments were found above and below the clay.

The clay itself was photographed *in situ*, dug out and taken away for possible testing. The clay is completely perforated with modern root systems. As the clay was extracted the shape seemed to change as it went further back into the hillside. This could have been due to plastic deformation as the clay moulded to movement of the overlying sands.

The main question still to be answered is;

Is the clay Cretaceous in age or a more recent Quaternary deposit?

Shenley Limestone found at Munday's Hill Quarry

On Saturday 23rd August, Dr Jill Eyers led a large group of people into Munday's Hill Quarry. This event was advertised through the LB Observer's Give It a Go! free magazine. The event was 100% over subscribed with original numbers being 20 and 41 people actually turning out on this beautiful summer's day.



The group were fitted out with safety wear; hard hats and hi-vis vests, before setting off to see the oldest exposures of the Woburn Sands in the quarry.



Jill explained the geology and everyone had a great time looking at the multi-coloured face. Following this brief introduction, everyone started off to the next exposure,

heads down searching in the Gault Clay that is used to backfill the worked areas.

Member, Simon Leonard, found an excellent ammonite specimen (see image right), whilst others were lucky enough to find gryphaea, belemnite, large oysters and small pieces of wood.

At the next exposure, a short lunch was enjoyed and then some serious



fossil hunting was undertaken. The group found large pieces of wood, some were approximately a metre long but sadly they were too embedded in the sandstone to extract. Other smaller pieces were salvaged for the B&LGG to use as hand specimens.

Now began the hunt for the Shenley Limestone. As Jill explained what we were looking for and its significance in Bedfordshire's geological history (see explanation box below), an excited member of the group approached and exclaimed he had found Shenley Limestone. Off we headed; up large sand spoil heaps and down sliding sand slopes to eventually, climb to the top of the exposures to find a very strange pile of rocks that resembled builders' rubble!

However, on closer examination, these scruffy looking bits of rock had bivalves and crinoid stems within them, as well as other shells. Unfortunately, the Shenley Limestone was not *in situ* but the B&LGG now has some excellent hand specimens for use in educational projects and displays.

Introduction to Shenley Limestone

The Shenley Limestone is unique to the quarries around Leighton Buzzard and is named after the area around Shenley Hill.

According to the BGS memoir for the area, it is "a condensed ferruginous phosphatic deposit with a rich brachiopod fauna" and "was formed in restricted environments, possibly on mounds on the contemporary sea bed."

The Shenley Limestone occurs above the Silty Beds and where present the Red Sands of the Woburn Sands Formation prior to the deposition of the Gault Clay.

Site Recording - it's not as scary as you think!

There are many ways in which an amateur geologist can help at a site recording.....

- Are you good at photography?
- Do you want to learn how to do a graphic log?
- Can you mark and bag samples or specimens?
- Can you sketch a rock face?
- Measuring beds is simple, whether it's using a ruler or a 4m pole!

All of the above skills are used during a site recording. It's all about the detail. Gathering information as you go; visually with photographs and sketches, then using measurements; firstly at a distance with a long 30m tape and then closer in at metre, centimetre and millimetre scale. You do not need to be an expert geologist to learn and have fun in the field. Come along to field events and you will soon be competent and confident in the field.
