As a child in Derbyshire, searching for treasures of galena, fluorspa, and the occasional limestone fossil within Lead Mine spoils, wondering at stalagmites, and tight's whilst potholing, was probably where my interest in geology began.

MK Science Festival

Members of the B&LGG joined in the MK Science Festival this year by taking geology into some of Milton Keynes Primary Schools.

On Wednesday 22nd October, Martin Whiteley, Jan Munro and Bev Fowlston all gave introductory Rocks & Fossils classes to Year 3's at various lower schools across Milton Keynes and Bletchley.

Dry Valleys explained

Dry valleys are valleys that have never been occupied by a stream. They are formed during Ice Age periods in geological history. The melt water from a glacier forms the valley by cutting into ground that is permanently frozen. They are being formed today in glacial regions around the world. Library Displays

The B&LGG poster display has been shown at Toddington Library and Shefford Library this quarter. It is to be erected again at Bedford Central Library in February 2009.

An interesting enquiry

B&LGG received an enquiry via email from Dunstan Arthur. He asked if these rocks pictured below were iron nodules.



Martin Whiteley, B&LGG's resident geologist, replied to Dunstan's query.

"What you've found are ironstone nodules from the Woburn Sands. They're quite common and they appear in all sorts of shapes and sizes, although tear-drop, flask-shape and round forms predominate.

Their formation is complex, involving the precipitation of iron-rich minerals around a nucleus of sand grains, fossil fragment or pebble. This happens soon after the sand was deposited on the shallow sea floor, whilst it still contains plenty of dissolved minerals. Nobody is quite sure why some nodules retain a 'soft-centre' of sand grains, but it suggests that the precipitation process worked from the outside inwards, and never infilled the whole body.

Some nodules have several crusts, often of different colour and composition (the manganese-rich ones tend to be purple). This suggests more than one phase of precipitation.

There are plenty of articles and pictures about nodules on the internet, although the scientific explanation about their formation is often woolly (like mine!). They're popular because they create such interesting forms and they are known from many stratigraphic horizons and different environments throughout the geological record. Thanks for bringing your collection to our attention and for providing such useful photographs. Keep your eyes open for more!"

Sundon Hills Walk and Talk

John Wong, Jan Munro and Bev Fowlston (with a lot of help from Martin Whiteley!) led a group of fifteen members and guests on a tour of Sundon Hills.

The day started off in Leighton Buzzard with some lovely



blue skies and a light breeze, however, by the time we reached Sundon Hills a few miles away there was a light persistent drizzle and the skies had turned a murky grey!

This didn't stop members from trekking across the hills of Moleskin and Markham Woods to finally emerge on the chalk grassland of Sundon Hills.

Jan gave us a wonderful commentary about the flora and fauna of the woods and downs as we went. She gave us all an insight into the management of this wonderful landscape which everyone found fascinating, asking questions of Jan as we went.

Once we emerged onto Sundon Hills, Bev and Martin told of the geological nature of the area with emphasis on the formation of the dry valleys and coombs during the Ice Age.

The group followed the five main dry valleys on a geological map provided by John Wong. On a clear day from the top of the Hills you can see far across the Gault Clay valley to the Greensand Ridge beyond.



Unfortunately, on this day we could just see Sharpenhoe Clappers in the distant (see photo above!).

The walk culminated in a short tour of the 19th Century disused quarry which exposes a wonderful section through the chalk and is topped by Totternhoe Stone.

Bev and John provided a car ferry for those who did not wish to trek back across the Hills. Many of the more hardy members did take a gentle stroll back across the way we had come.

A lovely day, despite the drizzle, was had by all. A big thank you to Jan, John and Martin for providing the information and knowledge to make an enjoyable day out.
